Tucson, Arizona – *I Dream in Widescreen*: BFA Thesis Films from The University of Arizona School of Theatre, Film & Television, will return this year to the Fox Tucson Theatre on Saturday, May 7, at 7:00pm, sponsored by Rica and Harvey Spivack.

This standing-room-only, annual event is the first chance to see original films from the UA Film & Television program before they travel the world to major international film festivals, such as Sundance and the Berlin International Film Festival (Berlinale), which internationally premiered the 2014 UA thesis film, *Bloodlines*, by Christopher Cegielski in February, 2015.

"We are delighted by the international recognition the films are receiving and for the growing industry support of this screening," said Professor Lisanne Skyler, Division Head. Guyton, *Non-Smoking Section*, where a rebellious teenager's desire to assert his independence from his mother could lead to explosive consequences, this year's thesis films are both original and diverse.

"It's not lost on me that it's a privilege to have a student film shown at a venue like the Fox Theatre, on a big screen with an audience of hundreds," said senior filmmaker Alex Guyton. "I think it's a responsibility to put out something that's worthwhile and worthy of all the pomp and circumstance. I hope they (the audience members) have fun, enjoy it and laugh."
